- ⇒ Priority for projects that:
 - Celebrate America’s creativity and cultural heritage
 - Invite a dialogue that fosters a mutual respect for the diverse beliefs and values of all persons and groups.
 - Enrich our humanity by broadening our understanding of ourselves as individuals and as a society

- ⇒ Seeking applications for research on major economic, social and political problems of the greater LA area
- ⇒ Preference is given to applied studies addressing policy
- ⇒ Potential for publication and its use by the community are also taken into account

Grant awards range in size depending on the project; recent research awards ranged between \$50,000-\$199,000. Click [here](#) for a list of recent grant awards.

Apr 1 – Visionary Grants with [American Psychological Foundation](#)

Up to \$20,000 to seed innovation through supporting research, education, and intervention projects and programs:

- ⇒ Applying psychology to at-risk, vulnerable populations (e.g. serious mental illness, returning military, those who are incarcerated or economically disadvantaged)
- ⇒ Preventing violence
- ⇒ Understanding the connection between behavior and health (e.g. wellness, diabetes, obesity)
- ⇒ Understanding and eliminating stigma and prejudice (e.g. race, gender, sexual orientation, religion, age, disability and socioeconomic status)

- ⇒ Open to nonfiction writers, photographers and documentarians
- ⇒ Applications open throughout the year for semiannual residency cohorts attending in Jan-May or Oct-Dec. Duration of stay may range from 4 weeks to 3 months.
- ⇒ Logan Nonfiction fellows are provided all the necessary tools to complete their critical work. Lodging, work space, sophisticated technological support (including Wi-Fi, a state-of-the-art screening room and dedicated space, equipment and software for video, film and radio editing) and meals are provided.

NEW! Jul 1 – [California Historical Society Book Award](#)

To recognize and promote an exciting new book-length manuscript in celebration of California's history and heritage. Carries \$5,000 advance and publication in both print and e-book formats by CHS/Heyday, with an awards ceremony, ample promotion, and an author tour throughout the state

Eligibility:

- ⇒ The topic should be broad enough to be of interest to readers throughout the state.
- ⇒ Authors with either manuscripts in progress or finished welcome to apply.
- ⇒ Manuscripts, when finished, should be at least 40,000 words. Preference given to manuscripts of fewer than 75,000 words.
